## The Blessed Virgin Mary

- Feast day: January 1st
- Patron of all human beings.

## St. Basil the Great

- Feast day: January 2nd
- Patron of hospital administrators and reformers.

In 370 CE he was made the bishop of Caesarea until his death in 379CE. He was a man of great learning and charity and never hesitated to renounce evil.

## St. Elizabeth Ann Seton

- Feast day: January 4th

Return to The Dome by: Anthony Moreno

After twenty-two long years since their final game at the Alamo dome, the San Antonio Spurs finally returned to their home for their 50th anniversary where they took on Stephen Curry and the Golden State Warriors.

Both teams had been experiencing difficulties leading up to this game at The Dome. Stephen Curry had suffered a left shoulder injury back in December 2022, when taking on the Indiana Pacers. Throughout Curry's absence, the Warriors had been playing decently well, entering the new year with a record of 20-21. Going into Friday night's game however, the Warriors were coming off a three-game losing streak after losses to the Phoenix Suns, Orlando Magic, and Detroit Pistons.

The Spurs had also lost one of their

valuable star players, Devin Vassell, to a knee injury. After that, they were a mixed bag of wins and losses and they ended 2022 with a record of 12 -24.

Entering the new year, not much changed for the Spurs, and heading into Friday's match-up, they were on a threegame losing streak. So, the big question was, could the Spurs snap out of their losing coma, or would the Warriors dominate the 5 time NBA champions in front of a record-setting 68,323 fans? Well, I've got all the stats and highlights of Friday night's game.

As the game began, it was clear that Golden State was unaffected by the record-breaking crowd, as they went on a 13-0 run during the six minute mark of the the first quarter. Stephen Curry already added seven points to his resume with eight minutes in the first as the Warriors led 17-4. The Spurs tried fighting back and put up a 9-0 run of their own, but as the first quarter came to a close, the Spurs were trailing 33-28. As we entered the second quarter, the Warriors would continue pouring it on with the points, ending the half leading 74-60. Donte DiVincenzo of the Warriors led all scorers with 12 points, 4 rebounds, and 4 assists.

As the second half began, the Spurs tried to stop the bleeding, but Golden State had other plans, as they shot 58.7 percent from the field and 47.2 percent from 3-point range. They were on the verge of a blowout as they led by 20 points. Following a steal and slam from Keldon Johnson, the Spurs attempted another run but unfortunately, it never happened.

When the third quarter came to a close, the Warriors were dismantiling the Spurs, 114 - 89. As the final quarter began, a comeback seemed



impossible for the Spurs following the Warriors, who continued to add pressure to the Spurs thanks to Warriors guard Jordan Poole going on a tear scoring 18 points and averaging five assists within 24 minutes. As the clock ticked down to zero, the Warriors ended their night with a 144-113 blowout win.



"Obviously, I hate to lose, but with the turnout, how can you be mad?" Spurs forward Keldon Johnson stated after the game. "The Spurs fanbase surpassed anything we could imagine. That made tonight special."

#### Stats

Jordan Poole scored 25 points, made 6 assists, one turnover, and

one steal. The returning Stephen Curry only scored 15 points, making only two three pointers out of his seven attempts. Donte DiVincenzo scored 22 points, had 2 steals, and 2 assists.

As for the Spurs, Tre Jones, scored 21 points, had 5 assists, and 2 turnovers. Keldon Johnson scored 17 points, had 1 assist, and 1 turnover. Romeo Langford scored 11 points and had 2 assists.

I've been wanting to review this album ever since October of last year. The album that featured Metallica's first music video and Jason Newstead's debut. I'm talking about Metallica's 1988 album *And Justice For All!* 

Metallica suffered a tragedy on September 27th 1986, when bassist Cliff Burton tragically lost his life in a bus accident in Sweden at the age of twenty-four.

Following Cliff Burton's funeral, the band found a replacement bassist in Jason Newstead. After a lengthy tour, the band returned to the studio, and eventually *And Justice For All* was released in the fall of 1988.

As compared to their last three albums, *And Justice For All* is diverse in terms of lyricism and sound. There are fewer verse-chorus structures, a more aggressive intensity, and faster tempos. "Blackened" deals with corruption. The title track

And Justice For All, delves into legal and political injustice. "Dyers Eve" is a lyrical rant from lead vocalist, James Hetfield, to his parents. "Harvester Of Sorrow" is about the pain and suffering that comes with losing a loved one. "Live is to Die" is the band's tribute to Cliff Burton.

In Metallica's catalog, one of the most infamous songs is "One." The song is about wanting an end to suffering and is based off the novel *Johnny Got His Gun* by Dalton Trumbo.

I did say *Master of Puppets* was Metallica's best work back in October, but *And In Justice For All* is my all-time favorite album from Metallica. This is one of those albums I can listen to on repeat for hours. I said I'd recommend checking out *Master of Puppets* for any new Metallica fan, but take your pick! Both albums are great! *And Justice For All* is a legendary album! It definitely deserves a 10/10!

How did you start out as a musician?

I started learning music theory and playing the flute when I was 6 or 7. My parents tried to make me do sports, but I didn't like it. Music was all right though, so I just kept going. I got into Rock as a teenager and bought my first guitar. I

started to learn by myself, but to be honest, I've never really enjoyed playing guitar. Even now, it's definitely not my favorite. So, I started to sing as well, very bad in the beginning but I did like it a lot more. While I was living in Japan, I used to go to karaoke alone to practice. I did that for years, alongside making music, always. I've written countless unreleased songs that were just too bad to be shown to the world, but I loved it. I also played in a few bands, but I wanted to be my own boss and express myself freely, which is why I chose to walk my own way.

#### Who are your musical influences?

Is there any song in particular that you've written that holds a special place in your heart? Well, the new song that's coming out on January 27, "Love Again," is probably the most meaningful to me as I wrote it for the person who I share my life with and changed me for the better, but you'll see for yourself next week. Aside from that, "Wavebird" is probably the one that defines me the most. It's kind of my anthem.

What is one message you would give to your fans? How do you want them to feel when they listen to your music?

My message is: do your thing. If you feel good doing something, whatever it is, just do it and try to take it to the next level. It might take one year, three years, or ten years to reach your goal, but it doesn't matter. What counts is the path leading to it and all the experiences you'll have along the way. My music is meant to empower you and make you feel different kinds of emotions, depending on the song you're listening to. ## Little DIY Party Popper

#### Need:

- 1 toilet paper roll
- 1 balloon
- design paper or colored paper
- Colored tissue paper
- Confetti/glitter/pompoms
- Hot Glue



- 1) Cut the end off of the deflated balloon and hot glue it onto the toilet paper roll.
- 2) Tie the end of the balloon in a knot.
- 3) Fill the toilet paper roll with confetti, glitter, or pompoms.
- 4) Glue the colored tissue paper over the entry of the toilet paper roll.
- 5) Hot glue the patterned paper over the toilet paper roll to add a design.

## Pinecones! - Flickery Edition

#### Need:

- 1 Pinecone
- 1 black sheet of paper
- Two small pieces of wire
- 2 googly eyes
- Green or yellow paint and brush
- Hot glue
- Scissors



1) Paint the tip of the pinecone green or yellow and let it dry. This will be the tail.

- 2) Hot glue the eyes and antennas onto the opposite end of the pinecone.
- 3) Cut the paper into ovals and hot glue them to the "back" of the pinecone.

Tip: Shiny paint adds more of a "glow" to your bug. Also, shape antennas to form twirls and other shapes to add intrest and character.
